

Grace O'Malley or Granuaile, was a 16th century member (and later head) of a renowned seafaring family who controlled the

southwest coast of County Mayo from her castle on Clare Island. Contemporary with Queen Elizabeth, her story in many ways parallels the queen's.

After 50 years and 300 trips to Ireland I look at the way Irish women found their voice elected two female presidents and changed oppressive laws all without experiencing the kind of divisions we're seeing in our country now. I've been inspired by my

own Irish Foremothers including those of my mothers family the Foley's who came to the US much earlier than the Kelly's and were instrumental in developing upstate New York, Wisconsin and Michigan.

Mary Pat Kelly is the author of Of Irish Blood, as well as the bestselling novel Galway Bay and Special Intentions. She has worked as a screenwriter for Paramount and Columbia Pictures, and as an associate producer with Good Morning America and Saturday Night Live. A graduate of Saint Mary-of-the-Woods College, she received her Ph.D. in English from the CUNY Graduate Center, New York. Born and raised in Chicago, she lives on New York's Upper West Side with her husband app developer Martin Sheerin from County Tyrone, Ireland.

Brigid Duffy performs Mother Jones' account of how she led children on a campaign to end child labor, in a march on Wall Street and to President Roosevelt's home. This powerful account of the conditions of children who were used to provide the coal and textiles of the early twentieth century allows us to see Mother Jones' spirit and defiance. Then learn about the campaign to place a statue of Jones in Chicago, with a discussion by Professor Rosemary Feurer.

Brigid Duffy has performed Mother Jones in the Chicago area for many years.
